GUILDHALL MUSEUM

The newly refurbished Guildhall Museum opened to the public on Saturday 6th May 2017. With the support of the Heritage Lottery Fund the interior has been completely reconfigured, with new display cases, reception area and audio visual equipment installed.

Some of the former fixtures and fittings have found a new home at the White Mill Rural Heritage Centre.

The museum team have worked hard to select a wide range of artefacts to illustrate the rich and varied history of Sandwich, many of which have never been seen by the public before. Volunteer stewards have been trained and are now ready to give a first class welcome to local residents, national and international visitors.

The project was undertaken by a combination of national museum experts and local tradesmen. Museum design was carried out by Daniel Sutton of Design Map, who designed the Cutty Sark museum. The museum refurbishment was undertaken by Benchworks who have worked at the Barbican, the V&A and the Science Museum. The specialist customised display cases came from Armour Systems who have provided cases for The Higgins, the Wonder Rooms at Selfridges and the 'Valor in the Pacific' exhibition at Pearl Harbour. Local firm Wyman's undertook the electrical work.

Special thanks for the successful funding application must go to Linda Elliott, the voluntary Honorary Curator & Archivist, who has been volunteering for just over a year, but has achieved a huge amount during this time. Linda has worked tirelessly pulling together the work for the refurbished museum, making new contacts and arranging partnership projects – including work with Royal Holloway and the University of Kent.



Now that the museum has reopened, Linda is now going to concentrate on work within the Guildhall Archives, bringing it up to modern standards, completing cataloguing and arranging for the return of many items to the collection currently held outside Sandwich, for example copies of the extensive medieval year books and the other documents discovered in the bound book that contained Sandwich's Magna Carta and Charter of the Forest.

The museum is free to visit and is open Wednesday-Sunday 10am-4pm so why not pay it a visit!

TEMPORARY EXHIBITIONS

In line with our development of the Museum we will soon have a set of high quality display cases and display boards that can be utilised for temporary exhibitions in the Guildhall Court Room. Exhibitions will include a Cinque Ports/Speakers Year, Battle of Sandwich and then tentatively pencilled in is a Kitchener Camp exhibition. Further details to follow – watch this space!



EXTRA RESOURCES FOR THE GUILDHALL PROJECT

As the scope of the Guildhall Project took shape, it became apparent that extra resources were required at the Town Council to support the Guildhall Project. Sandwich Town Council and Sandwich Toll Bridge Fund are in the process of appointing consultants to assist with Project Management and Business Planning.

So far we have held a number of consultations regarding the Guildhall project; the regular user group meeting which took place at the Guildhall in early March was a great success and the online survey has been completed by nearly 150 people, we also had a fantastic response during our consultation event at the 1940's weekend. KCC UPDATE

Following recommendations in the 'Which Way for Sandwich' report; Kent County Council (KCC) has started design work for No Name Street, the Guildhall Bus Stop and Market Street. At this early stage a number of options are being considered including making better use of the Guildhall bus stop and improving the flow of traffic to aid pedestrian movements and businesses loading and unloading safely.

Ideas being explored include:

- a) **Raising the levels of the roads to be in line with the pavements and improving the surface to help slow vehicles**
- b) **Moving the zebra crossing near Costa to align with the majority of pedestrian movements**
- c) **Making No Name St more pedestrian friendly with wider footways and reduced traffic flows.**
- d) **Making Market Street one way heading north.**

Local businesses have been contacted, and wider public consultation will take place when preliminary designs have been completed.
