## HAVE A GREEN CHRISTMAS



Did you know that some wrapping paper has a plastic coating and can't be recycled? If you want to buy paper then make sure it's plastic free and is FSC approved. Or....try our Green Christmas wrapping ideas!

- Re-use wrapping paper. Collect any paper that hasn't been torn and store it safely ready to use for next Christmas (this might mean you need to open your presents a little more carefully!)
- 2. **Use fabric to wrap presents.** Cut up old clothing or bed sheets and use them, with a ribbon, to wrap gifts. You could even wrap a present in a scarf and give the scarf as an extra gift.
- 3. Decorate your own paper with potato stamps. You will need plain paper such as parcel paper (try to find some made from recycled paper), paints and a potato. Ask an adult to help cut a 3D shape out of the potato with a knife. Cover the shape in paint then place on the paper to leave a print. Repeat to make a pattern.



## **GREEN GREETINGS**

Make your own cards from recycled and sustainable materials. First cut a rectangle of paper/card (use some from your recycling bin) and fold it in half to make a greetings card then choose from the 3 different decoration ideas below:

- 1. Cut up old Christmas cards and stick them on to your card to make a festive picture.
- 2. Stick on a green leaf to make a Christmas tree, ferns work best, then use scrap paper or paints to decorate your leaf tree with a star and decorations.
- 3. Make a twig tree by finding some dry, straight twigs. Snap them into different sizes then stick them on the card horizontally with the smallest at the top and largest at the bottom, leaving space for a twig trunk.

You can also cut up old Christmas cards or scrap paper to make gift tags. Once decorated all you need to do is ask an adult to punch a hole in one end and thread some string through.





## **DECK THE HALLS**

Shop bought decorations are often made from plastic or can't be recycled. So why not make your own from recyclable and sustainable materials. It's also a lot more fun!



You will need: cardboard, string and found objects (ferns, leaves, berries, pinecones).


**NATURE WREATH** 

Ask an adult to help cut out a ring of cardboard (about 30cm in diameter). Wrap one end of the string around the ring and tie a knot to hold it in place. Continue wrapping string around the ring and tie off firmly when you reach your first loop. You don't need to wrap the whole thing, about 30 loops is okay. Carefully poke your found objects under the string loops until the cardboard is covered. You may need to stick smaller objects down with glue or use extra bits of string to secure them. When you're finished, tie a loop of string at the top of the wreath and hang it up indoors.

#### **WOODEN STARS**

You will need: twigs and string.

Find five long straight twigs (about 30cm).
Arrange them in a star shape (as shown in the picture). Using string tie each corner together and then the five points where the sticks touch. Why not try making different sized stars or even one for the top of your tree. The smaller you go the trickier it gets!

## WILDLIFE NEWS

#### **WATER BABIES**

From November to April the brown trout in our rivers, like The River Dour in Dover, create a nest, called a redd, from stones at the bottom of the river.

This is where they lay their very delicate eggs which will hatch throughout the winter. It's very important to keep our dogs and our feet out of the rivers to keep the baby trout safe.



#### **SLEEPY LIZARDS**

Ranger Matt found these common lizards at Whinless Down in Dover. Lizards don't hibernate but go into torpor, which means they sleep a lot when it's cold.

If you find any sleeping lizards it's best to cover them back up until a sunny day when the reptiles will be awake enough to move away. If you can, leave them be until the spring.

#### PIP THE BAT

'Pip' the Kuhl's pipistrelle bat was successfully released back at Samphire Hoe last month.

She arrived very tired and hungry in September after flying across the channel! Kent Bat Group, who rescue tired or injured bats, looked after her and we wished her luck as she flew off into the night.
