1. Apologies

2. Welcome

Cllr Beer welcomed everyone to the meeting, and all introduced themselves.

3. Approval of Previous Minutes

The minutes of the meeting held 8 January 2025 were approved.

4. Warm Homes – John Underwood

John Underwood Energy Officer for DDC and leading the delivery partnership between Dover and Dartford Councils for the DESNZ funded Warm Homes scheme following on from the successful delivery of the HUG2 scheme. Targeted at Low-income owner occupier and private rented households. Property heated by all fuel types with an EPC rating of D-G.

Some eligible measures include – loft insulation, cavity wall insulation, solar panels and ASHP. **Pathways 1** Postcode and Income - The household lives in a validated postcode and falls within income deciles of 1-2 on the indices of multiple deprivation (IMD:ID 1-2) **Pathways 2** Means Tested Benefits – Households in receipt of a specified means-tested benefit. **Pathways 3** Low Income Threshold – The households gross annual income is below the schemes household income threshold (£36,000).

Households only need to meet one criteria pathways to be eligible. **JU** discussed the pathways in more detail, see slides. On applying, self referral via the government website, email, or calling John directly. All details on the slides.

Noting that fabric first approach is taken, insulation etc before installation of renewables technology.

Q1 Cllr Beer DDC– Further information regarding the scheme? Has the linked been tested? – JU It is an evidence based approach, Yes links tested and program is active.

Q2 Cllr Mallet STC– Do you have enough applicants so far? JU Funding is limited in year 1 and expands in Year 2 and 3 as project deliver ramps up. Funding for around 14 residents is expected in year 1 but this may increase depending on measures funding at each property.

Q3 Cllr Vinson DDC- What signposting is there for other residents? JU Newsletters, Parish booklets, DDC website and comms, and word of mouth.

Q4 Cllr Nee DDC– Do you think EPC rating are successful? JU EPCs are a snapshot of a property and are generally updated at point of sale or due to regulations. They provide an overall view of a property to support measures being discussed with owners and renters.

Q5 Cllr Nee DDC- Fabric first is that Doors and Windows? JU Insulation and upgrades if surveys are completed anything required is noted.

5. Future Foundry – Lisa Oulton

Future Foundry runs the youth festival in Dover, People, Place, Nature and Climate are the themes.

Weekly engagements and connections with 49 partners. They are Youth led, working with hard to reach communities. They provide minibuses and pizza to engage young people and enable access to projects. They have engaged over 500 young people in a consultation process asking – What do you think of Dover – Responses included, “think its dirty”, “neglected” and “run down”.

To address concerns Future Foundry have spear headed the Dover in Bloom bid for 2025. Perception the youth are not interested in culture, yet Dover is full of opportunities to explore youth culture. Working with a host of local delivery partners a brilliant Dover in Bloom judges guide was developed. With judging expected later in the year opportunities for 2026 and further youth and adult engagement to come.

Aylesham

- The Community Hub battery power storage system is due to be installed at the end of July. Installation delayed by supply issues
- St Josephs Primary School Grant aided Air/Water Heat exchanger now running successfully. Head Teacher comments "Installation more intrusive than first thought but now showing power savings"
- New development in the Centre of Village nearing completion with majority of homes with solar panels but sadly not the apartments.
- Community allotments construction has now started this month.

- Detailed planning application has now been submitted to DDC for the major Solar Farm between Tilmanstone and Nonnington. This is on farmland within a landscape of significance and is not universally popular with local residents with many objections already submitted.
- A major controversy recently affected the village when the TPO on Spinney woods was arbitrarily removed by DDC. This coincided and was conflated erroneously with the detailed planning application for up to 800 homes to the south of the woods. It resulted in a petition to DDC. On review, it was found that the TPO should not have been removed without a full planning application to DDC.

Heat Network

- Feasibility phase completed, further funding request from government.

Idling

- Work continues to develop an idling campaign.

Energy Efficiency

- Boxes will be available this Autumn.

- Post flooding resilience – DDC responsible for road debris (stones etc)
